Moths Count Update March 2010


After the coldest winter for over 30 years, spring-time is slowly approaching. Moth traps will be dusted down and set up for the coming season, if they're not out already. The Moths Count project is entering its final stages of its currently funded phase. Although the Moths Count project in its current form is due to end at this year, Butterfly Conservation will keep the National Moth Recording Scheme (NMRS) running in the long term.

Susan Anders' work as the project Outreach Officer has come to an end, however, she is still working part-time for Moths Count. Enormous thanks go to Susan who has been instrumental in promoting moths to the wider public. Susan has done a wonderful job in designing and producing the series of moth leaflets and arranging in excess of 90 public moth events which have introduced over 2000 people to the amazing world of moths. Garden Moths Count was also an integral part of Susan's work; this highly successful online survey attracted thousands of participants.

During 2010 we will be running several free moth training events. For further details please see the events list at the end of this newsletter So much has been achieved during the course of the project but there is still a great deal more to do!

National Moth Recording Scheme

Thanks to the efforts of County Moth Recorders and the moth recording community as a whole, 8.1 million moth records from 105 vice-county datasets are now held in the National Moth Recording Scheme (NMRS) database. The current coverage of all records is shown (*right*). Missing and updated datasets are expected in the next month or so; County Recorders are busy verifying and collating data as I write. Provisional distribution maps are publically available for all macro-moths on the Moths Count website (www.mothscount.org). These up-to-date maps provide valuable feedback to moth recorders and enable people to see their own records in a national context. Some 7.6 million moth records



from the NMRS have also been uploaded so far on to the National Biodiversity Network Gateway. The NBN Gateway is refreshed periodically hence the number of records here always lags behind what in the NMRS master database.

A major output of the Moths Count project will be a Provisional Atlas for macro-moths during summer 2010. This will be available online but some hardcopies will also be available. The Provisional Atlas will not be a glossy book with colour photos and species accounts, that's for the future. It will simply present new distribution maps for all species; the first for several decades. In order to enable timely publication, we have asked County Recorders to submit as much data as possible to us by **30 April 2010**. If you want your records to be included please get them to your County Moth Recorder as soon as possible. The NMRS will continue of course so there will be opportunities to submit further records to the scheme in the future.

Volunteer Hours

The Moths Count team would like to say a huge thank you to County Moth Recorders, record collators and volunteer workshop leaders who've contributed and submitted volunteer hours claim forms. I am pleased to announce that we have amassed a fantastic £300,000 of volunteered contribution. This time is a valuable in-kind contribution against our Heritage Lottery Fund grant. We've almost reached our target, but please do keep logging your time and forwarding your timesheets.

National Moth Night 2010

National Moth Night (NMN) is in its twelfth year and has become a fixture on the wildlife calendar. National Moth Night 2010 will be held on Saturday 15th May with the theme of *Moths and Bats*. This event will be organised jointly by Atropos, Butterfly Conservation (through the Moths Count team) and the Bat Conservation Trust. Joint moth and bat events will run across the UK, highlighting the links between these two groups of under-appreciated creatures of the night, both of which are showing worrying long-term declines. National Moth Night is a great opportunity to get out and do some recording or to organise an event for family, friends or the public to spread the word and raise awareness. Annual Microlepidoptera Review

John Langmaid and Mark Young compile the annual Microlepidoptera Review for the Entomologists' Record and Journal of Variation. For the review, John requires verified details of noteworthy records of microlepidoptera; specifically those new to the British Isles, new vice-county records and first records for over 100 years.

As with any collated dataset, format of the data for ease of use is paramount, Microsoft Word files are most satisfactory and preferred. Please include the following details: Bradley number; species taxa name; site name; OS grid reference; vice-county number; date; a comment and recorder's name.
